The Lodgepole Pine Podium Westbank First Nation *Westbank First Nation Community Forest*

The Podiums of the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games
18 wood types. 23 podiums. Hundreds of stories.

The Lodgepole Pine podium is used at Cypress Mountain for freestyle skiing and snowboard events. It is 478 centimetres long, 171 cm deep, 50 cm at its tallest point and assembled from 241 pieces.

Westbank First Nation – “Community, Leadership, Pride”

The Westbank First Nation has inhabited the Okanagan Valley for thousands of years. Their rich history as a hunting, fishing and trading community continues today, with successful natural resource, recreation, and land leasing operations. Their 700 members form the core of a vibrant community that is also home to 9,000 non-members and 200 businesses. The community neighbours the City of Kelowna and the region is adored by ski, sun, wine and golf lovers.

Westbank First Nation Community Forest

With medicinal and ceremonial plant inventories underway, the management of the 46,000-hectare Westbank First Nation Community Forest reflects traditional stewardship values. The wood for the podium was felled, processed, trucked and milled by members of the Westbank First Nation. Prior to making the journey to Vancouver, the lumber was blessed

by a community Elder and signed, with best wishes to the athletes, by the students at Sensisysten House of Learning, the local elementary school.

Lodgepole Pine

Culturally modified Lodgepole Pine trees are not uncommon in the Westbank First Nation Community Forest. The healthy and mature trees show areas where sections of bark were carefully removed generations ago to harvest the edible layer underneath. Today, Lodgepole Pine is used for lumber, plywood and panelling and as well as doors, windows, furniture, railway ties and fence posts.

Podium Production

British Columbia's Ministry of Forests and Range sourced the wood and co-ordinated podium production. The rough lumber was converted to panels at Metro Vancouver's Bayview Millworks, a high-end wood product manufacturer and distributor, and cut into complex shapes using sophisticated computer controlled machinery at the University of British Columbia's state-of-the-art Centre for Advanced Wood Processing. They were assembled at Canadian hardware retail leader RONA's Vancouver 2010 Fabrication Shop, a community-based training centre that teaches carpentry skills to new Canadians and at-risk youth.

British Columbia's Forest Sector

The wood podiums highlight the importance of forestry in British Columbia. The province is a global leader in sustainable forest management and the world's largest exporter of softwood lumber, paper and bio-energy products that help mitigate climate change and provide innovative solutions to green building and energy needs.
